#### Things You Can Do to Help Your Child Succeed on the MSA!

Parents can do specific things at home that will directly affect the success of their child's standardized test performance. It is helpful for a child to understand why schools give standardized tests. Remind your child that tests are yardsticks that schools use to measure and then improve education. Some tests compare students by schools, school districts, cities, and across the whole country. However, ALL tests determine how well they are doing and that is ultimately very important. While it is good to be concerned about taking a test, it is not good to get "test anxiety." Excessive worry can mean disaster for a student. You cannot just tell a child to stop worrying, tell them to think about something else, or relax. But, you can reduce test anxiety by preparing your child for the demands of standardized test taking. You can provide your child with a quiet, comfortable place at home to study and read. You can make sure your child is well rested and eats a well-rounded diet — paying particular attention to a breakfast. Be sure to express your confidence in your child and make sure they understand your expectations: not focusing on what their score will be, but rather reminding them to do their very best, listen carefully, and follow directions closely. After school, give your child praise for a good attitude and reward him with extra play time to release any that left-over nervous energy.

# A Building We Will Go! - Pre-K News

We will finish our theme Animals Everywhere and then we will begin the theme **Construction Zone.** 

During the theme, the students will read stories and do activities based on building and constructing and working together to solve problems. The students will learn to identify and write the letters **Bb**, **Mm** and **Rr**.

In **math**, the students will compare the length and height of objects using words such as longer/ shorter; heavier/lighter or taller /shorter. They will use standard and non standard units to measure the length, weight and height of objects. (Common Core Standards PK.MD.1 &PK.MD.2) In **science**, we will explore magnets and simple machines such as ramps, pulleys and wagons.

In **health**, we will discuss proper dental care. In **social studies**, we will create simple representations of homes, schools and the community. In honor of African American History Month we will learn about African American inventors.

It's already third quarter and our students are off to a wonderful start. As we continue to assess our students, we notice our students progressive development in Literacy, Math and Writing Skills.

The school year seems to be drifting by quickly – we're already halfway through the academic year. The first graders have really been working hard as they know that second grade is soon approaching.

They are enjoying learning about blends and digraphs, and their reading and writing abilities continue to soar. The first grade teachers continue to urge students to summarize stories read with minimal prompting. In math, students have tackled a quite complex skill of balancing equations. They soon will explore fractions. In social studies, they are studying food groups and the servings they should have of each group, daily. They seem to enjoy learning about good and services in social studies. The students are now exploring physics, as the earth science unit has come to a close.

The first graders are eager to learn and they are growing smarter by the day. They are excited about celebrating the 100<sup>th</sup> Day of School and Valentine's Day, as they are quickly approaching.

The first grade teachers urge parents to review student homework and to make certain that students are reading a minimum of 20 minutes, daily.

We have a completed our mid-year DRA testing and we see that progress is being made with second grade. The second grade is working of **African American History Biographies.** Students were able to choose an African American that shared the same career choice as they would like to be when they grow up or they most admired. You can visit the 2<sup>nd</sup> grade hallway and checkout some of the awesome projects that were submitted and learn a little history while your at it.

Continue to **read with your child each day** and **ask them questions as you are reading** to build up their understanding of text. Also continue to work on **basic addition facts** as we are now adding three digit number with regrouping in the tens and ones place.

Last but certainly not least we have been utilizing the **Mobile Mac Labs** once a week for research, Study Island, Spelling City, First In Math, or Moby Max. Students are becoming more familiar with using the computer as this will be something they need in upcoming school years for testing.

Happy New Year Parents and welcome back. We continue to focus on the Common Core Standards across the curriculum.

In **Math**, we are continuing our fact fluency quest - continue using First in Math to help increase fact fluency and earn those stickers! The next topic is fractions. The first project of the quarter will be our African American MATHEMATICIAN Biography 5 Pocket Person.

In **Science**, we are finishing our study of Space will be starting Physics.

In **Reading** we are discussing plot and plays. We continue to learn about the writing process by studying language, proofreading and phonic skills, identifying unknown words, theme, identifying character relationships within various text, analyzing text and interpreting text features. Learning these skills will help to bring deeper meaning to your child's reading stamina, fluency and comprehension.

In **Social Studies,** we are learning about natural resources found in many communities.

## 4th Grade News - Mrs. Jacques

In **Mathematics**, students will extend their understanding of fractions as we add and subtract mixed numbers with like denominators. We will also solve word problems involving addition and subtraction of fractions. As well as use baseline fractions to make line plots that display a data set of measurements in fractions of a unit. Please practice your math facts!

In **Science**, students are currently beginning Theme C ~ Physics, Electricity and Magnetism in Chapter 13. The next topic will be Theme D ~ Chemistry and Structure of Matter in Chapter 11.

Things are moving along in the **Reading Language Arts** department! We are continuing to work on inferences and main idea. An important topic that goes along with main idea is summarizing. It is important that students can conceptualize the information and place it in their own words. You can work on this at home by having students to read an excerpt from a newspaper or magazine and have the students to tell you verbally what they have read. Next, have your child write down the summary using details from the magazine or newspaper. A new indicator that we will begin is text organization. The students will read a passage and decide if it is organized by comparing and contrasting, cause and effect, sequence, main idea and supporting details, problem and solution, question and answer or chronological order. Please refer to your child's journal for notes that will be taken in class. As always encourage your child to read nightly. Reading nightly builds stamina and boosts student's vocabulary.

In **Writing** we are continuing to focus on our author study of Cynthia Rylant. We are working through the writing process and currently we are at the drafting stage. During the drafting stage students will plan, envision, and organize text. Authors, like Cythina Rylant consider the structure or organization of their stories when deciding how they will tell them. Students will use a narrative text structure when writing their drafts.

In **Social Studies** we are explaining the importance of the relationship between the Cherokee and the European Settlers. We will also describe the events that lead to the Civil War.

Homework is given on a daily basis. Please check the completed assignments against your child's Agenda Book.

#### Greetings Parents!
